🕸 Letter from our Chaplain

Dear friends and family of St. Andrew's, It is that time of year again when so much starts up after a summer away. We are no exception at St. Andrew's. Much has been happening at the Church of late, and there are plans in place for the upcoming year. This will include rewiring the church and in the New Year renovating the wash closet to make it handicap accessible.

The Lottery was a great success with the combined efforts of Thomas Fredén and Gillian Thylander. We took in more revenues than last year and a hearty thank you to all who contributed prizes, sold and bought tickets. This is an important fund raiser for the Church, Well done!

September 3rd was the Harvest Festival. Gillian and volunteers beautifully decorated the Church on Saturday for the Sunday Festival Service. We gathered on Sunday for a service graced by a special anthem sung by the Adult Choir and young people and a special music offering during communion presented by family members of the congregation. A pot luck dinner followed, generously donated by members of the congregation.

As you probably have heard, we are going to start up a children's and young people's music program as an outreach ministry of our church. The committee has appointed Mr. Stephen Craig, currently serving as assistant organist at Vasa Kyrka, for this enterprise. He is from England and is married with two young children. He plans on doing a Doctorate in Organ Performance and a masters in Choral Conducting at the University of Gothenburg. He has degrees from Universities in England and is a member of the Royal Society of Church Musicians. He specializes in children's choirs. He played for us on Easter so you will probably remember him from



then. We are fortunate to have a person of his caliber come to us to enhance the ministry of this congregation in this way. You may read more about him in his article.

It is intended that this music program will be an outreach of this Church to the Community. As Anglicans and being part of the Church of England, we have a rich musical heritage which spans the ages and has influenced the progress of the Western Church and civilization. This heritage is what Stephen intends to bring to this program and community. He and I plan on visiting schools in order to raise awareness of this program. Monies have been donated to initiate this endeavor and defer the costs to the parish.

I have been invited to address the International School on the 19th about Christianity

and its place in the world. I am very much looking forward to doing this. I will certainly be talking about St. Andrew's and its life and works as part of my talk.

Finally, on Saturday 26/8 there was a gathering at the Church at two o'clock organized by the Gothenburg Chapter of Democrats Abroad entitled "United Against Hate". The public was invited for a time to reflect on Racism in Western Culture and this event was particularly motivated by recent events in the United States in Virginia. Music, speakers

I am passionate about church music and like to see children and teenagers getting involved through singing. Singing helps children understand the complicated order of church services through active participation. Furthermore, they gain a musical education, which is a useful life skill in itself.

My vision is to establish a mixed boys and girls children's choir and teenage choir. Please let me know through David Bruce if you are interested.

Many thanks, Stephen Craig and personal reflection were presented to a gathering of about fifty persons to raise awareness of racism and its implications. Other such gatherings were concurrently held in Malmö and Stockholm.

Thank you for your time and consideration to all this, Gillian and I look forward to your continuing interest in the life and work of our Church as we continue to move forward and witness to our Lord in our midst.

Vestments

Over the summer St. Andrew's acquired a new set of Fucharistic Vestments. The colour is green which is used during the seasons of Pentecost and Epiphany. For that reason green is the colour used for about half of the Church's year. When I arrived in May of 2016 the old green set had been in use for many years and was showing its age. It had been repaired from time to time but was still getting ragged around the edges. I put word out about acquiring a new set and many options were considered. Finally, with the re-organisation of the Ladies' Guild, Marie Lygonis donated monies from that organisation to put towards a new set. Over the course of the year Gisela and Keith Barnard and Gunilla Ramell donated additional monies. toward this cause.

In June I had an appointment with Bishop David at the Diocesan Office in Church Yard. Westminster, London, When I was finished there across the street was the London Shop of J.R. Whippels, Church Accessories Exeter. They are an old and venerable establishment from whom I purchased my first set of clerical regalia when I was finishing Theological College forty years ago. They had five green sets on display and I chose the one that I thought would best fit into the setting of St. Andrew's. The cost of them exceeded that which was donated so I made up the difference. They are a beautiful set representing very fine and traditional workmanship. They include the stole, the vestment representing the voke of service of the ordained ministry and the chasuble, the Eucharistic vestment. representing the burial shroud of Jesus. The chasuble is only worn by Bishops and Priests when celebrating the Eucharistic Sacrifice.

The vestments were blessed for service to the Greater Glory of God in July by the Chaplain in thanksgiving for all those who have served God over the years at St. Andrew's and in Memory of Timothy McCabe and Eleanor Bruce nephew and cousin of the Chaplain who passed away last spring.

We look forward to their beautifying and gracing our worship for years to come. Thank you all who made this possible.

One final note - if you would care to donate an additional set we could use a white set for the reasons mentioned above. White is the colour of celebration. They may be given as a memorial or act of thanksgiving. Please see the Chaplain if you are interested.

South Asia floods kill 1,200 and shut 1.8 million children out of school

Hundreds dead in India, Nepal and Bangladesh, while millions have been forced from their homes and 18,000 schools shut down across the region

More than 1,200 people have died across India, Bangladesh and Nepal as a result of flooding, with 40 million affected by the devastation. At least six people, including two toddlers, were among the victims in and around India's financial capital.

The devastating floods have also destroyed or damaged 18,000 schools, meaning that about 1.8 million children cannot go to classes, Save the Children warned.

The charity said that hundreds of thousands of children could fall permanently out of the school system if education was not prioritised in relief efforts.

"We haven't seen flooding on this scale in years and it's putting the long-term education of an enormous number of children at great risk. From our experience, the importance of education is often under-valued in humanitarian crises and we simply cannot let this happen again. We cannot go backwards," said Rafay Hussain, Save the Children's general manager in Bihar state.

The rains have led to flooding in a broad arc stretching across the Himalayan foothills in Bangladesh, Nepal and India, causing landslides, damaging roads and electric towers and washing away tens of thousands of homes and vast swaths of farmland.

The International Federation of the Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies (IFRC) says the fourth significant floods this year have affected more than 7.4 million people in Bangladesh, damaging or destroying more than 697,000 houses.

They have killed 514 in India's eastern state of Bihar, where 17.1 million have been affected, disaster management officials have



been quoted as saying. In the northern state of Uttar Pradesh, about 2.5 million have been affected and the death toll stood at 109. The IFRC said landslides in Nepal had killed more than 100 people.

Streets in Mumbai have turned into rivers and people waded through waist-deep waters. One Tuesday, the city received about 12.7cm (5ins) of rain, paralysing public transport and leaving thousands of commuters stranded in their offices overnight.

Rainwater swamped the King Edward Memorial hospital in central Mumbai, forcing doctors to vacate the paediatric ward.

Floods in 2005 killed more than 500 people in the city. The majority of deaths occurred in shanty town slums, home to more than half of Mumbai's population.

Low-lying parts of the city with a population of more than 20 million people experience flooding almost every year but large-scale flooding of this magnitude has not been seen in recent years.

"We are mapping all the flooding zones to launch a project to build emergency shelters to make evacuation easy," said Tagade.

Several companies have arranged for food and resting facilities for employees stuck in offices. Temples and other Ganesh pandals have been offering food and water to people stranded on streets.
