
# Letter from our Chaplain

Dear family and friends of St Andrews,

The long hot summer is over and we are enjoying some cooler weather as well as getting much-needed rain. I hope that this has alleviated the problem in the country over the forest fires. We can now look forward to the autumn and the changing season and enter in to a new time in the church. The long green season of Trinity will continue till the first of Advent but as you know the church year really begins at the same time of the Academic Year. A lot of people have been away this summer and now they're returning and once again we are entering into our life together as a community of faith witnessing to the life of Jesus Christ to our community.

Many things have happened in the life of the church largely as far as our infrastructure goes so I will share a few things about that with you now.

In June the committee voted to put the Surplus gained over the past year to some good use. The computer system and printer in the church office have been upgraded. A subcommittee has taken on the task of once and for all dealing with the mold problem which has bothered us for many years. As a result of the renovations in the church over the past winter, many of you have expressed a desire to petition off the back of the church with a transparent wall. During the construction of the new toilet the old wooden wall which was temporarily constructed proved that the space at the back of the church could be utilized for things like Christian education. It would also give our families a place to take their children during the service if they get restless. Another subcommittee took on the task of having



the architect design several options around this and we finally came up with a plan that seemed to make everyone happy and the city planning board has approved it. Right now it is being investigated as to how we will fund this project and we are reaching out to grant-awarding organizations to help us meet the cost. So more on that later as we get to know what is available to us.

Events coming up are the International Service at the German Church on the 21st of October. Rememberance Sunday which will be celebrated in our church on the 11th of November with the British Ambassador to Sweden in attendance. We will celebrate our patron saint St Andrew on November 25th. Then on the 19th and 23rd of December will be the service of Nine Lessons and Carols for Advent and Christmas at 18:30. And as usual on Christmas Day which will be Tuesday the 25th this year there will be the celebration of the Christmas morning Mass in the church at 11 am.

Much is being planned for the Fall by many dedicated people for the various events which are taking place so if you wish to have more information please speak to the Wardens or myself as to how you might participate.

Many new people have shown themselves at the services over the summer and have come back and joined us. We welcome them as they enter into the life of our spiritual community.

The readings over the past Sundays may be summed up that in our relationship with

God through our Lord Jesus Christ we are provided with what we need for our journey. The Gospel has reminded us that while we need food for the body we also need food for the soul. Jesus puts it this way in John's Gospel I am the Bread of Life whoever eats this bread will never die. It is in our worship in the Bread and Wine on the altar that we have this brought home to us most significantly. In sharing the Bread and Wine we are given life in him and in each other. So join us and participate in the Heavenly Banquet God offers us. Food for Body and Soul.

# Appeal in order to build a Glass Partition at the back of the church

We are starting a plan for securing the neccessary financing of a glass wall at the back of the church, which will enable us, among other things, to hold a Sunday School every Sunday. We have also applied for a grant that may help us. But we cannot afford to wait on possible grants since we consider it to be URGENT that we start the Sunday School as soon as possible.

We have commissioned the arkitekt to produce a more realistic cost analysis of the project and to produce drawings for the same.

The analasis shows that the total remaining cost ought to be about 440 500 kr. minus the 55 250 kr. already debited for the sketches needed for a preliminary approval by Länsstyrelsen.

Sermon for Harvest Festival

These words of Jesus from the Gospels speaks of the condition of our church today. We have a great harvest this Harvest Festival. Everywhere we look in our Parish of Saint Andrews we can see signs of growth and renewal.

The committee has gone ahead with plans to further improve the infrastructure of our church and make it more user-friendly toward groups particularly the Christian education department. During the announcements your Wardens will speak to you about the proposed building of a wall across the back of our church to provide space for the sunday-school to meet as well as a place for children during the service. You'll be asked to give your consensus of this project and to consider supporting going ahead with it.

Our music program with its renewed leadership and commitment to developing and enhancing the music of this Parish has made major strides over the previous year to introduce new music to our services and enhance the liturgy of the communion service. # 2018 Kerala floods

## Monsoon rainfall that affected India from August 13 to 20, 2018

Red alert issued by India Meteorological Department (earlier in August) Beginning in July 2018, severe floods affected the south Indian state of Kerala. due to unusually high rainfall during the monsoon season. It was the worst flooding in Kerala in nearly a century. Over 483 people died, 14 are missing. At least a million people were evacuated, mainly from Chengannur, Pandanad, Edanad, Aranmula, Kozhencherry, Ayiroor, Ranni, Pandalam, Kuttanad, Aluva, and Chalakudy. All 14 districts of the state were placed on red alert. According to the Kerala government, one-sixth of the total population of Kerala had been directly affected by the floods and related incidents. The Indian government had declared it a Level 3 Calamity, or "calamity of a severe nature". It is the worst flood in Kerala after the great flood of 99 that happened in 1924.

Thirty-five out of the fifty-four dams within the state were opened for the first time in history. All five overflow gates of the Idukki Dam were opened at the same time, for the first time in 26 years. Heavy rains in Wayanad and Idukki have caused severe landslides and have left the hilly districts isolated. The situation was regularly monitored by the Prime Minister, and the National Crisis Management Committee coordinated the rescue and relief operations.

### COPENHAGEN PRIEST CALLS FOR CHANGE IN ATTITUDE TO 'NARROW' BRITISH VIEWS ON INDIA

TOO often, when British people think of India, they focus on the maharajas and the British Raj, or "grinding poverty and misery".

This is the perception of the Chaplain of St Alban's, Copenhagen, the Revd Smitha Prasadam, who last month took part in a conference that sought to tell a bigger story about the country.

"People's views of India tend to be quite narrow," she said last month. "It's a culture of many faiths and many languages, but the focus tends to be on maharajas and therefore the British Raj lifestyle, or, at the other extreme, the Dalits; so it's always the grinding poverty and the misery. But the fabric of India is so much more, and the great big middle band is ignored. They are people of great faith and great spirituality."

Among those speaking at "Listen to India", a week-long event at Launde Abbey organised by Christians Aware, was Shoba Gosa, the founder of a charity based in Hyderabad, Young People for Life India. She described how among the city's population of seven million were many young people who arrived alone to work in multinational companies.


Many were drawn to the mega-church at which she was working, because it was "modern, non-judgemental. Anyone can walk in, but it's rooted in the gospel and goodness of Jesus." Currently, more than 3000 young people, mainly young men, attended the four services held throughout the day, and among the services the charity provide was counselling.

For her talk on Hindu-Christian encounters, Ms Prasadam spoke alongside her mother, Canon Jemima Prasadam, who was the first Indian woman to be ordained in the Church of England, in 1994. Common grounds in both faiths was joy, she suggested, and "key images of light and dark", illustrated both in Diwali and the beginning of St John's Gospel. They also shared "a quest for holiness". She also gave talks on Sadhu Sundar Singh and Pandita Ramabai, two Indians celebrated in the C of E's calendar but, she said, too little-known.

She expressed concern that, too often, interfaith conversation was driven by fear and counter-terrorism efforts. "Friendship ought to be the driver for any conversation."

One of the organisers of the conference, Canon Andrew Wingate, a self-professed "India-phile" who lectured at Tamilnadu Theological Seminary from 1976 to 1982, spoke last week of "amazing links" between the two countries. Meeting Indian Christians gave those in Britain "energy", he suggested, helping them "not to feel depressed as we so often are". In Leicester, almost 30 per cent of the population are Indian/British Indian, and 15 per cent are Hindu. Taken from an article in the Church Times by MADELEINE DAVIES
